Meantime, inspired by the newcomers, I have taken the plunge and signed up for Module 1. That'll keep me out of mischief until we can get into the hives again.

Back in the day...

I've been trawling the archives to bring you seasonal snippets from branch meetings of yesteryear. Some entries raise more questions than answers.

6th February 1943

A Committee Meeting was held at the Unity Café, 14 Williamson Street, Liverpool, followed by the $2^{\rm nd}$ AGM. (The Committee included Mr Shuker, after whom our 'Shuker Cup' is named). The Treasurer, Mr Hunter, gave the financial position for the year and regretted to say that there was a deficit on balance in the neighbourhood of £4.

An appeal was made to members to meet the deficit by a subscription. The Treasurer also appealed for donations towards the Red Cross Agricultural Fund. Mr Hunter announced also that the sugar allowance for spring feeding was now available.

It was decided that demonstrations should be held during the period May to September and the Chairman asked that it should

be made a condition, that refreshments should not in any way be provided. (Wartime rationing)

The question of beekeepers in the Forces was raised and it was suggested that expert beekeepers who were willing to assist in this direction should hand their names to the Secretary.

For the March meeting it was decided that Mr Prince should give a lecture and demonstration on his Automatic Swarm Recorder and Hive Weighing Device.

21st February 1952

The Secretary began the Committee meeting by reviewing the list of members and allotting members to advisers as usual. Advisers' reports were read and showed a state of bad beekeeping in the Branch. Mr Palmer thought there was now a certain loss of interest. Mr Shuker said all Associations were losing members. Mr Sims said that many members didn't get any honey.

7th February 1957

Mr Nichols and Mr Baldwin were to be proposed for the permanent Foul Brood Officers for the Branch area. The Secretary proposed that in view of the late Mr Shuker's long services to beekeeping and to the Lancashire Association that a memorial to him should be established. It was agreed that a fitting tribute would be a silver cup to be presented to the Association to be awarded for the best exhibit of Sections.

18th February 1960

Mr Arthur Gillett is now on the Committee (since 1958).

2nd February 1961

The Chairman said that we would be welcome to hold a summer meeting at Grant Road School now that they had a hive of bees established there. Mr MacAuley made a suggestion that we could hold our Honey Show in a room at the Officers' Club at Walton Prison and he said that the facilities of the Club would be available to members.

At least we don't go to prison any more just for keeping bees!

This month in Sheila's Garden...

Finally walked around the garden to find the viburnum bodnantense loaded with sweet scented flowers. The two winter flowering mahonias are just tailing off and flowers turning into edible berries for the birds (or us!). Both the cultivated hazel and the witch hazel are full of



catkins. The white winter flowering honeysuckle has only a few flowers as it was smothered by the hop this year. Will move one of them.

Snowdrops in full flower, while yellow crocus and hellebores are in colour but not yet open. One of my white cyclamen has flowered through the winter, along with the hebes which are now down to one or two flowers. I've not seen bees on bergenia (elephant ears) but they are just coming into flower. Our garden being a bit windy, the daffs are not yet showing. Today is like spring, probably about 12C with the bees flying around 1.30 pm. The two smaller colonies were up and active under the glass quilt as I finally, belatedly, gave them candy. Haven't checked the two larger colonies yet.

Spotlight on ...

Paul Hitchiner

Paul, a retired Civil Engineer, developed "a crazy interest" in beekeeping just two years ago and acquired his first bees and equipment free through eBay! He got another couple of hives and bees from one of our other members and through careful management and judicious manipulations he already has seven colonies! Mind you, he can hardly fail with Barry Chang as his mentor and helper and Arthur Gillett as his inspiration. Unfortunately, while collecting the first colony,



Barry, unusually, got stung, but the bees left Paul alone. He takes great

His bees are on the allotment site where he manages a plot and he says the crops from his fruit trees have increased exponentially since he got bees on site. The pollination service is a bonus that goes down well with his fellow allotmenteers. Paul also spends time on church business and plays piano-accordion, self-taught and "one-handed", at services. He's working up to chords.

Paul is the quiet man of our Committee and keeps a low profile but he has a knack of being on hand when help is needed. And not just for us lot. He was a great help with the Beginners Course the other week and arrived straight from his regular stint helping his wife, a retired midwife, with the food bank that she established to help Persian refugee members of the church. I think the bees will do well with Paul.
