Hello beekeepers!

The new season is nearly upon us and activity outside the hives suggests two of our colonies are bouncing, with loads of pollen going in. Sadly, our third colony has expired. The bees were all dead, either on the floor or in small clusters on the frames in the brood box. There were lots of stores plus fondant on top and

the bees on the frames were all right next to or directly underneath the food. So I don't think they starved, but possibly got chilled from the sudden onslaught of the 'beast from the East' combined with the fact that they were a less strong colony than the other two. This year's lesson: if you have to question whether a colony is strong enough to go into winter, don't risk it, unite them with another colony. But right now, we are keen to see queen cells...



This year's queen-marking colour is - **Red**

Will Yellow Roses Grow Best?

This is one of the mnemonics for remembering the sequence of colours:

Years ending in 1 or 6	-White -	Will
Years ending in 2 or 7	- Yellow -	Yellow
Years ending in 3 or 8	- Red -	Roses
Years ending in 4 or 9	- Green -	G row
Years ending in 5 or 0	- Blue -	Best

BBKA Basic Assessment

If you have been keeping bees for a year, then you should be thinking of taking your BBKA Basic Assessment. It is carried out by a BBKA assessor at a suitable apiary (not your own) and has two parts: a practical assessment (colony inspection and making a frame) followed by answering some questions with the assessor. The fee for the assessment is £20.



It does need a reasonable amount of knowledge, so it is a very worthwhile undertaking. We will be running a course to prepare people for the assessment and this will consist of some correspondence-learning. We email you questions and then give feedback on your answers. So you can fit it in with your other commitments. We could also run a practical session if there is a demand.

Asian Hornet Action Teams (AHATs) are being set up in BKAs across the UK, with the aim of fighting the establishment of Asian Hornets, by speeding up the identification and verification process, to enable the NBU to deal with any Asian Hornet incursion/s efficiently and cost effectively.
